The means by and dates at which most of this material reached the Library cannot now be ascertained. The existence of an early typescript list of the correspondence suggests that much of it formed part of a single deposit. A note by J.M.Keynes (in the Lydia and Maynard book) indicates that he received some papers from Mary Paley Marshall before her death (1944); he may have handed them on to the Library then or later in his capacity as an executor. Further items, particularly those initially contained in the "Large Brown Box", seem to have been received at later dates and from a variety of sources. The typescript list received by the Library in 1946, headed "Letters written and received by Professor Marshall" describes it as a single series, arranged alphabetically by writer. Some drafts and copies of replies by Marshall and a number of letters to Mary are included. His correspondence with Macmillan & Co. and letters in response to the publication of his 'Money, Credit and Commerce' (1923) appear in separate sections. The use of the heading "Envelope Order" suggests that this arrangement may have been the Marshalls' own. In later years it was partially altered (for instance, Mary's letters were separated from Alfred's) but it now seems justifiable to reverse these changes. Thus, although many of the letters now in the collection do not appear in the pre-1946 list, the principles employed at that time have been adopted in this present catalogue.

Content Summary

The main series, containing letters to and from Alfred and Mary, is followed by shorter series relating to particular events: Marshall's 1902 campaign for an economics Tripos, the publication of the fifth edition of his `Principles' in 1907, and that of `Money, Credit and Commerce' in 1923. In each of these cases the constituents of an original bundle have been arranged alphabetically by writer. Marshall's correspondence with Macmillan, on the other hand, has been placed in date order.

They knew nothing of Marshall's privately printed papers [printed by Henry Sidgwick 1879 as Pure Theory of Foreign Trade'; `Pure Theory of Domestic Values'] when their own work appeared and still have no copy of them. Would have been pleased to cite his authority in corrobation of their own views. A bookseller, seeking the work for them, had written to Marshall who had replied [1906.4.25] that the contents of his papers could be found in certain chapters of the `Principles' and in Prof. [Maffeo] Pantaleoni's 'Pure Economics' [1889]. Lieben has looked at these references, but cannot see a great similarity between the references given and their own work. There was a greater resemblance with certain diagrams taken from Marshall's papers in Cunynghame's book, but they are not identical.

Neither of them had any relationship with the University [of Vienna], but worked under the direct impulsion of Walras and Jevons without any encouragement from the university's economists, who do not know the mathematical method. Isolation continued after publication of their research which had been well received by [Francis Ysidro] Edgeworth and Irving Fisher but by no-one in Austria or Germany. Discouraged, they did not pursue the subject and failed to read [Maffeo] Pantaleoni's book. So they had followed Marshall's work quite independently without being aware of it, in the same way that Walras, Jevons and Menger arrived at the discovery of marginal utility. Grateful for Marshall's letter. The days of one's youth never return, yet are perpetually present. Never thinks of Henry Sidgwick as dead, but alive in some metaphysical sense. Tragedy of separation noted by [Arthur Hugh] Clough is compensated for by communication to our friends of light received on our separate voyages of discovery. His son, Kenneth, quoted Clough in recent sermon. Has always believed Marshall best able to deal with both sides of political economy, as recognised by Mill: scientific side, dealing with unalterable facts, and emotional and expansive side, dealing with reform. Finds plain facts difficult to understand; as a schoolboy, had great difficulty understanding "stocks" until he owned some. A bill of exchange is a mystery. Economists might do more to make elementary matters more understandable to the inexperienced. Wonders whether he has made similar mistake in his book about prayer. What does Mrs Marshall think? Quotes two pertinent sentences from Marshall's letter relating to the "Unknown", the first expressing a theory, the second concerning the practice of life. Feels that the "Unknown" helps us in our efforts and that in religious language the "Unknown" is God. Recommends the fifth chapter of his book [The Divine Aspects of History] on China and Japan. Mentions their visit to Murren [Switzerland] in 1867. Mrs Marshall knows his sister-in-law. Hopes to see Marshall if he visits Cambridge. Will ask his son Kenneth about Marshall's nephew.

Would like to avoid this controversy, but will give his opinion on matter of national concern. A University seeks the truth; the Fabians seek to indoctrinate people with a set of ideas. Fabians dominate Board of London School of Economics. Other Governors are very eminent men and preoccupied; there may soon be a Fabian majority, and [Sidney] Webb will have sole authority in matters of detail. He will retain a few critics like [Edwin] Cannan, but will have financial control and use School to indoctrinate society. This may not matter if Faculty of Economics at London University remains broadly-based, but LSE may monopolise teaching. For this reason alone, Marshall is interested in controversy over examinations. Initially thought the matter irrelevant but now sees that LSE, because of size, might be able to "cram" students for examination as no other school can. Everyone loyal to University Ideal and opposed to a propagandist university, should fight any tendency by one school to monopolise economics teaching, whatever the nature of its propaganda. This letter can be shown, at Ramsay's discretion, to anyone he thinks good, in particular Silvanus P. Thompson who referred to the London difficulties in recent letter. Is too busy with Cambridge movement [creation of an Economics Tripos] to write again.

Grateful to Marshall for agreeing to give Pitt Press (Cambridge) correction for `Elements' [of Economics of Industry] quickly. Anxious to issue reprint before present edition is exhausted. Interested in what Marshall says about Net Book System. The 'Times' methods are only accidentally connected with net books. Times Book Club started because proprietors found paper's circulation dropping due, they supposed, to competition. Did not want to reduce own price of 3d. but offered subscribers free use of circulating library. This was found too expensive, so they set out to monopolise by underselling rivals and driving them out of business; thought they could then dictate prices at which they bought books from publishers. Began by offering to take large numbers of certain popular novels at "absurdly" low prices on condition that publisher paid for advertising in The Times. E.g. they offered to buy from Macmillan 1,000 copies of a 6/- novel if latter would supply them at 3/- and spend £100 on advertising in Times. As author received 1/6 per copy and book cost at least 1/6 to produce, this was not acceptable. Considering sort of people managing Book Club, could imagine how they would act if monopoly were established. Publishers, with assent of authors, avoided trap "set by the astute Americans and baited with extravagantly large orders". Book Club managers then made outrageous charges against publishers, but without effect. Net book system is another matter. Macmillans began it 17 years ago when booksellers by "insane competiton" had cut their profits to extent that to avoid bankruptcy they were giving whole attention to "fancy goods" and toys, less space to books. Believing book sales are increased by having them kept in stock by dealers in all parts of country, tried to devise plan to keep booksellers solvent and buying good stocks. Impossible if booksellers are allowed to undersell each other, so publishers decided that for certain classes of books they would only give trade terms on condition of books being sold at prices fixed by publisher. In fixing terms aimed at discount sufficient to give bookseller fair profit after expenses but not big enough to tempt him to break price. Thinks the terms arranged are reasonable but principle same in any case, viz. sale price is fixed by publisher. Net system is confined to books "which retailers may be expected to speculate in to some extent", sale affected by their exertions. School books not published at net prices since bookseller acts mainly as delivery agent. If new arithmetic or latin grammar is brought out, Macmillans must do the pushing themselves, sending teachers presentation copies, prospectuses, catalogues of new books, and representatives visiting not to sell but show books. Prices at which elementary school books are supplied are so closely cut that bookseller gets little profit and sale is nearly all in hands of a few contractors. I have postponed as long as possible the suggestion that it should go to Press; because the far reaching changes in public opinion and in the activities of Whitehall, which were notable before 1914, are now moving at an unprecedented pace.
